CCB's also assist individuals with gaining access to Medicaid Waivers. Waiver programs provide additional Medicaid benefits to individuals with special needs.

The Health First Colorado Buy-In Program for Working Adults with Disabilities lets adults with a disability who qualify to "buy-into" Health First Colorado (Colorado's Medicaid Program). If you work and earn too much to qualify for Health First Colorado you may qualify. If you qualify, you pay a monthly premium. Your monthly premium is based on your gross monthly earned and unearned income after any applicable disregards.

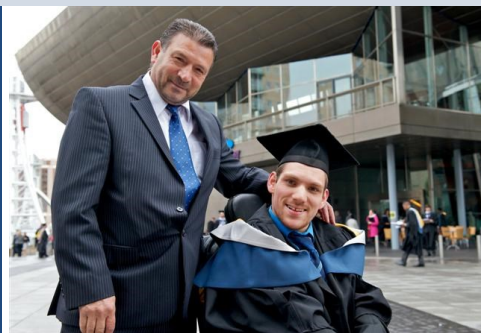
Options for Families

Guardianship - assist with the personal affairs and make decisions on behalf of an adult who is incapacitated.

Conservatorship - manage finances and property for an adult who is incapacitated and whose assets may be wasted unless management is provided.

Medical Durable Power of Attorney - It is a document which gives authority to another person to make medical and personal decisions.

General Durable Power of Attorney - gives another authority to manage the adult's finances, property and transact business on their behalf.



Helpful Hints on Social Security / Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

- Go to www.ssa.gov and go to the "SSI" tab and then "Frequently Asked Questions" and find the answers to most of your questions.
- If you do not qualify for SSI keep a copy of the denial letter and that will be important when applying for one of the Medicaid Waivers Programs.
